



## DAILY COVID-19 UPDATE

January 26, 2021

### WHAT HAPPENED TODAY

Today, in opening floor remarks, Senate Majority Leader Chuck Schumer (D-NY) called for boosted unemployment insurance, state and local government aid, and funding for vaccine distribution in the next COVID-19 relief legislation. He mentioned that while he would prefer to work on this in a bipartisan manner, he is willing to proceed without the support of GOP lawmakers if necessary. Leader Schumer added that the chamber could utilize budget reconciliation to pass COVID-19 relief with a simple majority vote. A vote setting up the process could come as early as the week of February 1.

President Joe Biden struck a similar tone yesterday, stating the decision to use budget reconciliation or not "will depend upon how these negotiations go." He also noted COVID-19 relief negotiations will probably last a "couple weeks," and that it is too soon to tell if the entire package will be able to pass with bipartisan support.

However, it is important to note that in the event that budget reconciliation is utilized, Democrats cannot afford to lose a single vote among their members.

There are currently eight Democrats who have reservations about the size and make-up of the proposed stimulus and as such, this pathway could also pose a challenge for Leader Schumer.

At a press briefing today, White House press secretary Jen Psaki indicated that all Americans who want to get the COVID-19 vaccine will not "be eligible this spring." At the same time, NIAID Director Dr. Anthony Fauci predicted that everyone could receive the vaccine by the end of the summer, while Dr. David Kessler who heads the U.S. vaccination program (formerly known as Operation Warp Speed), anticipates most U.S. adults won't be vaccinated until the third or fourth quarter of the year.

## PUBLIC HEALTH UPDATE

### *Congressional*

#### HOUSE

- Reps. Jason Crow (D-CO), Lauren Underwood (D-IL), Jimmy Panetta (D-CA), and Dean Phillips (D-MN) [introduced](#) the *Health Force, Resilience Force, and Jobs to Fight COVID-19 Act*. The legislation would recruit, train, and employ Americans to expand our public health workforce to respond to the COVID-19 pandemic, aid the country's lagging vaccine distribution campaign, and strengthen America's longer-term public health response.
- Rep. Andy Biggs (R-AZ) [introduced](#) two pieces of legislation related to the COVID-19 vaccine. The first bill prohibits the use of federal funds to maintain or collect information that can be used to identify any individual to whom a COVID-19 vaccine is administered. The second bill prohibits the use of federal funds to propose, establish, implement, or enforce any requirement that an individual wear a mask or other face covering, or be vaccinated to prevent the spread of COVID-19.

### *Administration*

#### NATIONAL INSTITUTES OF HEALTH

- NIH [launched](#) a new database that will collect information from clinicians about COVID-19-related neurological symptoms, complications, and outcomes as well as COVID-19 effects on pre-existing neurological conditions. The COVID-19 Neuro Databank/Biobank (NeuroCOVID), which was created and will be maintained by NYU Langone Health, will be a resource of clinical information as well as biospecimens from people of all ages who have experienced neurological problems associated with SARS-CoV-2 infection.

#### FOOD AND DRUG ADMINISTRATION
