



DAILY COVID-19 UPDATE

February 16, 2021

WHAT HAPPENED TODAY

Today, White House press secretary Jen Psaki [announced](#) that the U.S. will increase its weekly supply of COVID-19 vaccines to states, territories, and tribes by providing 13.6 million doses per week as of this week, up from 11 million doses last week. This boosts the total vaccine supply to states by 57% since January 20. Also, the federal government is doubling the vaccine supply for retail pharmacies, with 2 million doses set to be delivered this week in an effort to "expand access in neighborhoods across the country."

This week, the House Budget Committee will continue compiling various components of the Biden administration's \$1.9 trillion American Rescue Plan into a single bill, with plans to mark up the legislation on Thursday. In a call today with House Democrats, Majority Leader Steny Hoyer (D-MD) indicated that the chamber could vote on a coronavirus relief proposal on February 26.

Meanwhile, the Senate committees with jurisdiction over the relief package are expected to forgo markups and bring the bill directly to the Senate floor.

PUBLIC HEALTH UPDATE

Congressional

HOUSE

- Reps. Suzan DelBene (D-WA) and Pramila Jayapal (D-WA) led 25 members of Congress today in a [letter](#) to HHS Acting Secretary Norris Cochran, demanding that the Department ban preferential access to COVID-19 vaccines while establishing greater accountability measures. They also requested responses to three questions related to preferential access and the inequitable distribution of the COVID-19 vaccines.

Administration

THE WHITE HOUSE

- President Joe Biden [issued](#) a statement on the 2021 special health insurance enrollment period through HealthCare.gov.

DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES

- HHS [announced](#) additional Biden-Harris Administration appointments.
- HHS and the Department of Defense (DOD) [purchased](#) an additional 100 million doses of COVID-19 vaccines from both Pfizer Inc. and Moderna Inc. to help meet demand for COVID-19 vaccines in the U.S. The orders placed Friday bring the vaccine purchased by the U.S. government from these two companies to a total of 600 million doses, enough to vaccinate 300 million people. Each company is delivering 300 million doses in regular increments through the end of July 2021.
- In accordance with the [Executive Order](#) signed by President Biden, CMS [announced](#) that the Special Enrollment Period (SEP) for the Health Insurance Marketplace is officially be available to consumers in the 36 states that use the HealthCare.gov platform from February 15 through May 15. At least 13 States plus the District of Columbia, which operate their own Marketplace platforms, have decided to offer a similar opportunity.

NATIONAL INSTITUTES OF HEALTH

- NIH Director Dr. Francis Collins [penned](#) a blog post titled, "ACTIV Update: Making Major Strides in COVID-19 Therapeutic Development."
- A study led by researchers in the NIH’s National Institute of Diabetes and Digestive and Kidney Diseases (NIDDK), [found](#) that face masks substantially increase the humidity in the air that the mask-wearer breathes in. This higher level of humidity in inhaled air, the researchers suggest, could help explain why wearing masks has been linked to lower disease severity in people infected with SARS-CoV-2, because hydration of the respiratory tract is known to benefit the immune system.
- A new study has [identified](#) early risk factors that predicted heightened anxiety in young adults during the coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic. The findings from the study, supported by NIH and published in the Journal of the American

Academy of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry, could help predict who is at greatest risk of developing anxiety during stressful life events in early adulthood and inform prevention and intervention efforts.

- In an editorial published Friday in JAMA: The Journal of the American Medical Association, experts from NIAID, outlined how COVID-19 variants have arisen, concerns about whether vaccines currently authorized for use will continue to protect against new variants, and the need for a global approach to fighting SARS-CoV-2 as it spreads and acquires additional mutations.

FOOD AND DRUG ADMINISTRATION

- The FDA revised its guidance, Investigational COVID-19 Convalescent Plasma and associated web page, to reflect the reissued emergency use authorization for COVID-19 convalescent plasma. Specifically, the guidance provides recommendations to blood establishments on the collection and labeling of high titer COVID-19 convalescent plasma under the EUA. In addition, the revisions address when individuals who have received an investigational COVID-19 monoclonal therapy as a participant in a clinical trial, or received an authorized or licensed COVID-19 monoclonal antibody therapy, qualify as convalescent plasma donors.

Administration

DEPARTMENT OF LABOR

- DOL announced the award of \$49 million in grants to support 28 states and territories as they continue their efforts to combat fraud in the Pandemic Unemployment Assistance and Pandemic Emergency Unemployment Compensation programs. The department is making these awards from \$100 million in funding announced Jan. 15, 2021 for states to combat fraud in these programs.
