WHAT HAPPENED TODAY

Today, the Biden administration announced a series of new actions along with \$1.6 billion in funding to expand and improve coronavirus testing efforts. Specifically, the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) and the Department of Defense (DOD) will invest \$650 million to enhance testing for K-8 schools and underserved, vulnerable populations such as those in homeless shelters; HHS and DOD will make a \$815 million investment to ramp up domestic production of testing supplies; and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) will invest close to \$200 million to boost genome sequencing of the virus to study and prepare for new variants.

Last night, in a [CNN town hall](#), President Joe Biden stated that by the end of July, the U.S. will have over 600 million doses of the COVID-19 vaccine available. However, President Biden noted he does not expect a return to reasonable normalcy until Christmas 2021. He added that by this time next year, he expects there will be

"significantly fewer people having to be socially distanced, hav[ing] to wear masks, etc...but we don't know for certain."

During the town hall, President Biden also signaled he is willing to negotiate on the \$15 minimum wage increase in the upcoming relief bill. He stated it is "totally legitimate for small-business owners to be concerned about" the minimum wage increase, adding he is open to a longer phase-in period than the current 2025 timeline.

Additionally, Senator Joe Manchin (D-WV), a centrist swing vote, told President Biden that he will not vote for passage of his \$1.9 trillion coronavirus relief legislation if the package violates the Senate's Byrd rule and includes "extraneous" measures such as the \$15 minimum wage increase.

Meanwhile, House Budget Chairman John Yarmuth (D-KY) stated, "I think the minimum wage is a stretch to get through the Byrd Rule. I'm just not aware of how they do that." Rep. Yarmuth added that he expects his panel to clear the American Rescue Plan and send it to the House floor by the end of this week or next Monday.

Senate Majority Leader Steny Hoyer (D-MD) announced the House will shift its schedule by one day next week to allow for longer bill preparation time. Leader Hoyer even cautioned members that the chamber may need to remain in session through the weekend to complete its work.

Notably, a CDC spokesperson, Kristen Nordlund, warned of "widespread delays" of shipments and deliveries of COVID-19 vaccines "over the next few days" as a result of the winter storms impacting a large portion of the country.
